100 years old and still going strong



Founded 100 years ago, in 1926, the CHI Geneva (CHIG) is one of the most prestigious horse shows in the world. Year after year, it attracts the best riders and drivers on the planet to Palexpo, the biggest indoor arena on the global circuit, boasting a floor area of nearly 5,000 square metres.

Named the world's best horse show on ten occasions, the CHIG is one of the four majors of the Rolex Grand Slam of Show Jumping, along with the Dutch Masters in 's-Hertogenbosch (NED), the CHIO Aachen (GER) and the Spruce Meadows "Masters" in Calgary (CAN).

Held last December, the 64th CHIG was the latest edition of the event to prove a resounding success. The cream of the world rankings assembled in Geneva, with nearly every rider showing up with their best horses. According to Equiratings, the riders and horses that contested the Rolex Grand Prix amounted to one of the strongest fields of the year (750 points in total), with the Rolex IJRC Top 10 Final not far behind at 747 points.

Remarkably, the CHIG has provided the setting for nine of the ten competitions with the most statistically impressive fields since 2010.

The five-day celebration ended on a high note with the Rolex Grand Prix, as the Swiss watchmaker marked its 25th year as event sponsor in style. On board the amazing Greya, the USA's Kent Farrington posted **1** his 11th major win in Geneva and his second in the Grand Prix. The world number one at the time, Farrington more than made up for his second place in Friday evening's Rolex IJRC Top 10 Final, where he was edged out by Scott Brash on Hello Chadora Lady **2**. The two riders are locked in quite a tussle for global supremacy at the moment, with the Briton relieving the American of top spot in the world rankings at the start of 2026.

Another highlight of the 64th edition of CHIG was the indoor cross event, presented by the *Tribune de Genève* and won by Janneke

Boonzaaijer **4** of the Netherlands, while Boyd Exell **3** lived up to his status as red-hot favourite for the Geneva leg of the FEI Driving World Cup, winning it for an incredible 14th time.

The CHIG will be celebrating its 100 years of existence on 9-13 December. Comprising five days of international competition, one more than usual, the programme features the return of several spectacular events that have helped forge the horse show's identity over the years. Its loyal spectators can also expect a host of new attractions and innovations, both inside and outside the Palexpo arena.

And to make the wait for the centenary CHIG more bearable, the organisers have a number of other surprises in store over the summer and autumn. All will be revealed in due course.
